Due to circumstances beyond our control, we have had an unusual start to the school year. Despite this fact, it was evident in our grade level kick off assemblies with the student body that our students want to have a successful year. To this end, we will endeavour to minimize interruptions to the learning environment as much as possible. I would like to reassure you that we have a very dedicated staff whose priority is to meet the learning needs of all students. ## **PowerSchool**

For parents and students new to the HRCE, please be informed that students are able to access their academic real time information by logging on to their individual private account in the student portal. Parents may use their assigned password to access their child's information, which includes attendance, assignments, teacher's grades. comments, and upcoming school events. Students and parents will be able to log on at home, work or school; anywhere there is Internet access. # Student Engagement & Guidelines

Students attending Dartmouth High are expected to be enrolled on a full-time basis. A student may be scheduled for a maximum of 8 credits in any academic year, however the minimum course load for a full-time student is:

- Grade 10 Eight courses (four courses each semester)
- Grade 11 Seven courses (three courses one semester/four the next semester or vice versa)
- Grade 12 Six courses (three each semester)

Students who do not follow these required guidelines may not be eligible to participate in extra-curricular activities. Note that third year students are normally enrolled in a minimum of three courses in each semester. These guidelines serve to optimize student achievement and preparation for post-secondary options and opportunities.



#### **COMMUNICATION PROTOCOL**

We feel strongly that the key to solving problems is by identifying them early and take the necessary steps to find positive and timely solutions. If you have a concern or a question about your child's evaluation or program of study, we would ask that you make contact with the individual classroom teacher first. Contact information for subject teachers are listed on the school's website and in your child's Student Agenda. The teacher is the main person and first line of communication in your child's education. The department head would be the next level of contact if you are not able to resolve the issue with the teacher.

# **Tobacco Policy**

Tobacco products are not permitted on or within 4 metres of school property as per Provincial and School board policy. # **Exam Exemption Policy**

Exam exemptions have been re-instated at Dartmouth High and it is our hope that students will take advantage of the opportunity to opt out of one exam each semester by adhering to the following items.

A student is eligible for an exam exemption if he/she has:

- A full semester enrolment in no fewer than 3 courses
- No more than six explained absences or lates in each course.
- Completed all major tests and major pieces of evaluation in each course.
- Never been suspended from school during the semester of eligibility.

Please note that Math and English courses at all levels as well as AP coursed are not exemptible.

# French Immersion Transfers to English



Dartmouth High will not be able to accommodate "out of area" students wanting to switch from the FI program to the English program. Consequently, students enrolled in the FI program who live out of area and wish to switch to the English program will be required to enrol in the English program in their neighbourhood school. To obtain the FI certificate, FI students are required to take core courses offered in the French Immersion program to meet requirements for the FI Certificate and must take a minimum of 9 courses in the French language.

#### **Student Success & Attendance**

Reducing a course schedule may limit post-secondary options and as such, we do not encourage students to drop courses in which they are enrolled. In the event a student drops a course by refusing to attend the class or complete assigned work, the accumulated mark to that point will be reflected on the transcript and will affect the student's overall average. This will also apply to students who are enrolled in courses but refuse to attend classes.

Please note that students risk losing a credit for a course in which they have missed 18 classes (20% of the course material). Proactively, we keep a close eye on students' attendance and will have regular conversations with students and parents so we are all on the same page. If students are disengaged because it is felt that their learning needs are not being met, we encourage students and parents to bring this to the attention of the school. We encourage self-advocacy on the part of the students to articulate their learning needs as academic supports are available. This year, we have instituted a Study Hall, equipped with subject area teachers for every block. This is a place students to receive one-on-one assistance, makeup a missed assignment or test (within reason). While teachers will normally refer students for Study Hall, Grades 11 and 12 students can also self refer and report to Study Hall on their off block.



Last year, we embarked on year-one of a new Student Success Plan. As a Professional Learning Community, collaborative time was spent among colleagues in subject specific departments, and with the staff as a whole to identify the learning needs of our student population over the course of the year. The SSP team lead in facilitating an assessment and analysis of the data to determine common trends emanating from the various professional conversations among the groups.

The recurring theme was centred on aspects of communication in Math and Literacy as well as social and emotional learning emerged as a goal to address our school climate. Guided by educational experts in professional development sessions, the team along with key staff members were able to broaden their knowledge base and insights into social and emotional learning. Ongoing professional development will enrich and solidify our learning as we move forward with our implementation plan.

#### School goals:

Goal 1: To improve student achievement in math and literacy by strengthening communication, comprehension and interpretation skills.

Goal 2: To improve student achievement through continued development of skills related to social and emotional learning.

## **Personal Development Credit**



The Italian Language School at the Italian Canadian Cultural Association of Nova Scotia in Halifax (ICCANS) has been approved for a second five-year term as a provider of a Personal Development Credits in Italian Language and Culture for grades 10, 11 and 12.
